### What is Palliative Care?


Specialized, integrated medical care for people with serious illness, focused on providing patients and families with relief from the symptoms, pain, and stress of a serious illness – whatever the diagnosis.

Palliative care is appropriate at any age and at any stage in a serious illness, and can be provided together with curative treatment. We work closely with the treating team to help patients and families identify and achieve **meaningful, realistic goals of care** across the spectrum of illness, from diagnosis until end of life.

### Palliative Care

- Targets sickest, most vulnerable, costliest patients and their families
- Provides an additional level of support for patients and their caregivers
- Helps simplify transitions across care settings

### **Demonstrated Benefits of Palliative Care**

- Decrease in ICU LOS
- Decrease in avoidable ED utilization
- Decreased readmissions
- Substantial cost avoidance and improved efficiency
- More timely referrals to supportive programs in community (palliative RN, population health, case management, hospice)
- Additional support for the treatment team
- Improved job satisfaction for staff
- Improved patient satisfaction

### Primary vs. Specialist Palliative Care

#### • Primary palliative care

- Identification of unmet needs
- Basic discussions of diagnosis and prognosis
- Awareness of advance care planning documents
- Basic code status discussions
- Symptom management

### Primary vs. Specialist Palliative Care

#### • Specialist palliative care

- On-going discussions of complex goals of care
- Refractory symptoms
- Severe spiritual, existential or psychosocial distress
- Poorly defined, inconsistent or unachievable goals
- Complex family dynamics, social issues
- Challenging decisions regarding the use (or potential termination) of life-prolonging treatments
